Profile 2022-23

Hillel Yeshiva High School is a coeducational, Jewish Orthodox, dual-curriculum school, committed to providing its students with an excellent education in both Judaic and General Studies. The school aims to produce ethically sensitive young men and women who are engaged in the world around them and possess the skills, knowledge, and understanding needed to make a significant contribution to the Jewish, American, and global communities in which they live.

Community

Hillel Yeshiva High School (established in September 1983), located at 1027 Deal Road, in Ocean, New Jersey, is about 55 miles from New York City and serves as a regional Yeshiva High School for Central New Jersey.

School Characteristics

Student Population: Hillel Yeshiva High School, a private community school with a population of 240 students in grades 9-12, draws from a wide range of students from various municipalities in New Jersey and New York. Tuition subventions for needy students are available.

Faculty: The faculty consists of 44 men and women, 90% of whom have earned advanced degrees.

Calendar: The school year, consisting of a minimum of 170 days, is divided into trimesters. Midterms occur in mid January; finals take place in May and June.

School day: The school day runs from 8:00AM to 5:05PM Monday-Thursday and from 8:00AM to 1:10PM on Friday. Students enroll in ten full-term courses each year.

Curriculum Features

Hillel Yeshiva provides a dual college preparatory program for all students. Courses are offered as College Preparatory (CP), Honors (H), High Honors (HH), or Advanced Placement (AP). The General Studies curriculum includes the following requirements:

- Four years of History (World, Jewish, American, and an elective),
- Four years of Literature (Introduction, American, British, and an elective),
- Four years of Math (Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II, Precalculus or Calculus)
- Three years of Science (Biology, Chemistry, electives in 11th and 12th grades)
- Two years of Foreign Language/Four for HH students (Hebrew)
- Two years of Writing (Expository Writing I and II).
- One year of Introduction to Spreadsheets (Microsoft Excel, Google Sheets)

The Judaic Studies curriculum includes the following requirements:

- Four years of Torah She’Baal Peh (textual and conceptual analysis of written and oral Jewish law)
- Four years of Halakha (study of the application of Jewish Law)
- Four years of Navi (textual and conceptual analysis of Prophets and Writings)
- Four years of Chumash (textual and conceptual analysis of the Bible)
- One year of Philosophy of Prayer (analysis of the structure and philosophical concepts of daily prayers)

In addition to the required core general studies subjects, Hillel Yeshiva offers the following Advanced Placement (AP) courses (courses offered in 2022-23 are in bold):

- Biology
- Calculus AB**
- Chemistry**
- Computer Science A**
- Computer Science Principles**
- United States History**
- United States Government and Politics**
- English Language and Composition**
- English Literature**
- Physics C: Mechanics
- Psychology**

Please note that the maximum number of AP courses a student may take is limited to three courses during 11th grade and four courses during 12th grade.

Eleventh grade students may choose academic electives in the Sciences and Writing; twelfth grade students may choose academic electives in the Sciences, English, and History. Electives vary based on student interest, and new courses are often developed. Below is a list of electives offered over the past three years:

Covid-19 Information

Hillel Yeshiva High School ceased in-person instruction on 3/13/2020 and transitioned to distance learning on 3/17/2020. During distance learning, the school day was 9:30 AM - 4:00 PM with seven 30-minute classes. The school uses a trimester grading system and all grades remained numerical throughout the school year, making final grades an average of the three semesters.

For the 2020-2021 academic year, Hillel held in-person instruction five days a week for the majority of the students with distance learning available for those unable to attend in-person. In the distance learning option, students attended synchronously via live streaming and were required to be active participants. Our numerical grading policy remained in place this academic year, along with our entire college preparatory curriculum.
